**Year 1- Homes- Summer**



During this unit, children will take a closer look at the main features of different types of homes. They will find out about some features of homes built a long time ago, such as thatched roofs. Children will start to think about how homes have changed over time. They will investigate what the interior of Victorian homes were like. Using photos of reconstructions as well as photographs of rooms taken in Victorian times, they will start to identify some features of Victorian homes. They will explore some common objects found in Victorian homes, such as bellows and mangles. They will continue to identify similarities and differences between Victorian and modern homes.

### Key Questions

- Can you recognise and name different kinds of homes?
- Can you describe features common to all modern homes?
- Can you identify key external features of homes?
- Can you describe the features of homes built a long time ago?
- Can you identify similarities and differences between modern houses and houses built a long time ago?
- Do you understand what is meant by 'Victorian' and that it was a long time ago?
- Can you describe some of the features of Victorian houses?
- Can you identify differences between modern homes and Victorian homes?
- Can you recognise some objects found in Victorian homes?
- Can you identify some differences between objects found in modern homes and Victorian

<b>Detached</b>	<b>Not connected or attached</b>
<b>Semi-detached</b>	<b>A house that is joined to another by a shared wall</b>
<b>bungalow</b>	<b>A one storey house</b>
<b>Medieval</b>	<b>Having to do with the middle ages</b>
<b>Tudor times</b>	<b>During the Tudor reign</b>
<b>Georgian</b>	<b>From the period of King George I to IV</b>
<b>Victorian</b>	<b>During the reign of Queen Victoria</b>
<b>Out house</b>	<b>a small shed used for an outdoor toilet.</b>
<b>scullery</b>	<b>a room adjoining a kitchen, where dishes and utensils are cleaned and stored</b>
<b>Washboard</b>	<b>a board with a ridged or corrugated surface of glass, metal, or other hard material, used for rubbing soil and stains out of clothing.</b>
<b>mangle</b>	<b>A machine that wrung out water from washed clothes</b>
<b>bellows</b>	<b>A bag that can be expanded to draw air in and squeezed to force air out. Bellows were used to blow air on a fire</b>
